Recently, my wife and I accompanied our friends to a church to watch the movie “Courageous.” I should first note that I tend to find Christian movies to be rather cheesy. However, this movie was actually well done. Perhaps what I appreciated most was that the main character was a good father. He provided for his children, he was home at night, they attended church together, etc. However, he comes to a point where he realizes he does not want to be a good father. He wanted to be a great father. After much searching, he offers the opportunity for his friends to hold him accountable to his choice. In essence, he decides that he would lead his household as the spiritual leader God had called him to be.

As Christians, I hope we are never satisfied with being “good enough.” My goal is not just to be good, but to be great. I want to be a great father. I want to be a great husband. I want to be a great pastor. The author of Hebrews reminds us to “provoke one another to love and good deeds (Hebrews 10:24).” I take that as a reminder that we are not to be satisfied, but we are to be seeking to move forward in our relationship with God and other people. Therefore, I believe that we should continue to look at our lives and see what we can do to further our relationships with our family members. Men, we should seek to be great husbands and fathers. Women, you should seek to be great wives and mothers. It is in seeking this greatness that we will be the foundations for our children’s future.

While I appreciate the statement within the movie and the desire that most of us have to be better people, there is a reality that we stagnate into a status quo. Personally, I need people in my life to hold me accountable to achieving those goals. The Bible talks about our need to have others to help us in our faith journey. Paul says that we are to encourage and uplift one another. It stems all the way from the Proverb that as iron sharpens iron, so one person should sharpen another. It is my prayer that St. Andrew is full of people seeking to sharpen each other all for the glory of God.

Wednesday Evenings - 6:30 to 7:30 PM

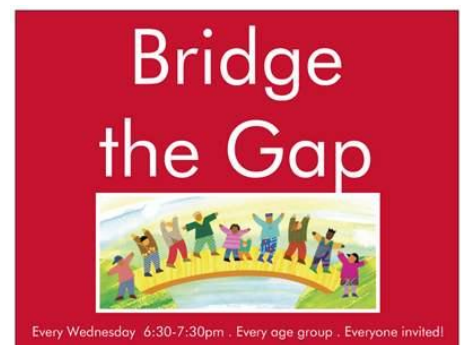
Our goal for Bridge the Gap is to offer something for every age group. Here are the exciting options available this winter through spring:

Classes for children K-6 will be available featuring exciting games and activities along with an interactive lesson.

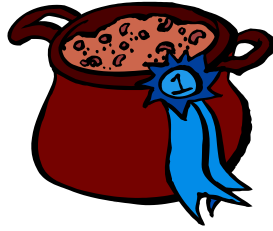
A Confirmation class for any student grades 7-12 who wishes to confirm their baptism or to be baptized will be held.

Judging for the Chili Cook-Off is at 5:00 PM. Dinner will be open to everyone at 5:15 PM.

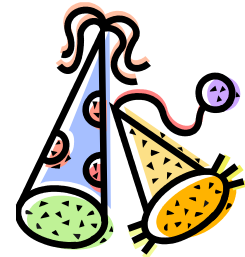

SOCKS and MORE 2012

As you may know, our own Alvin L. Moyer, MD, is a pediatrician who lovingly cares for children at Elizabeth Seton Pediatric Center (ESPC) in New York City. ESPC is a faith-based center providing pediatric, rehabilitative, and palliative care to reveal God's love to all in need, especially the poor.

Almost 140 children, from just weeks old to twenty-one years, reside at Seton. About a third have life-limiting problems (tracheotomy, ventilator dependent, etc.). Another third require short-term rehab, but are too medically complicated to go home. The final third are wards of the state. These children may have been abused and/or may be medically fragile. Of the last third, about 20% receive palliative (end of life) care.

Dr. Alvin says many of these children come from "average" families, where there is just not enough room in their homes or apartments to accommodate all the medical equipment essential for the children to live. A few of the children may be from foreign countries.

In the past, many of you joined SAW in providing socks and items on Seton's Wish List (see below). From the staff at Steton we've heard, *"Once again, thank you so much for everything you donated,; you guys have been so wonderful for the children here."*

As part of SAW's missions outreach, we plan to provide socks again this year. If you'd like to participate, *beginning February 12th* there will be a Socks Box in the Welcome Center where you may place your contribution.

What type of socks are needed?

Babies and children to 48 months - Ankle style socks
Children 4 years to young adults 21 years old - Long socks that will fit over braces
NO ankle length for this age group

Reflections on Lent

The season of Lent has not been well observed in much of evangelical Christianity, largely because it was associated with "**high church**" liturgical worship that some churches were eager to reject. However, much of the background of evangelical Christianity, for example the heritage of John Wesley, was very "high church." Many of the churches that had originally rejected more formal and deliberate liturgy are now recovering aspects of a larger Christian tradition as a means to refocus on spirituality in a culture that is increasingly secular.

Originating in the fourth century of the church, the season of **Lent** spans 40 weekdays beginning on **Ash Wednesday** and climaxing during **Holy Week** with Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday), Good Friday, and concluding Saturday before Easter. Originally, Lent was the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, a time of concentrated study and prayer before their baptism at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community.

Today, Lent is marked by a time of prayer and preparation to celebrate Easter. Since Sundays celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, the six Sundays that occur during Lent are not counted as part of the 40 days of Lent, and are referred to as the Sundays **in** Lent. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling. Christians today use this period of time for introspection, self examination, and repentance. This season of the year is equal only to **the Season of Advent** in importance in the Christian year, and is part of the second major grouping of Christian festivals and sacred time that includes **Holy Week**, **Easter**, and **Pentecost**.

Lent has traditionally been marked by penitential prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Some churches today still observe a rigid schedule of fasting on certain days during Lent, especially the giving up of meat, alcohol, sweets, and other types of food. Other traditions do not place as great an emphasis on fasting, but focus on charitable deeds, especially helping those in physical need with food and clothing, or simply the giving of money to charities. Most Christian churches that observe Lent at all focus on it as a time of prayer, especially penance, repenting for failures and sin as a way to focus on the need for God's grace. It is really a preparation to celebrate God's marvelous redemption at Easter, and the resurrected life that we live, and hope for, as Christians.

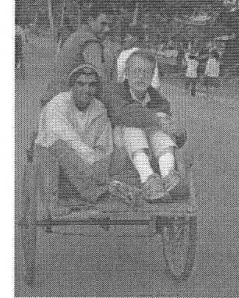
For those of you who do not like sports analogies, I must apologize in advance because some recent events of this past NFL season were the inspiration for this article.

Part of my morning routine is listening to a sports talk radio show called "Mike and Mike" on 97.5 FM on my way to church. Sometime between the end of the season and the first round of the wildcard round of the playoffs, Mike and Mike spent a considerable amount of time talking about the actions of some of the New York Jets players. Numerous players gave anonymous quotes to a New York reporter bashing their quarterback and blaming their 8-8 record on the fact that their quarterback was content and did not work hard enough. It is worth noting here that the Jets made it to the AFC championship game the two seasons prior to this one with basically the same team quarterback and all. The part that struck me is what happened next on the radio show. Mike and Mike brought in analyst Herm Edwards to give his take on the situation. Herm said this (and I'm paraphrasing) "On the journey of life travel the road of humility, there's not much traffic on that road." His point was well made in both the arena of football and life. If you want to be successful you need to take the road less traveled. This is exactly what Jesus tells us to do if we wish to travel the road that leads to life. Since hearing Herm's quote I have been encouraged to continue to carry out the theme of evaluation in my life, and to look at my life and assess my qualities, traits, and actions that have me traveling down that broad path, and attempt to change them to match up with the teachings of Jesus so I can better travel that narrow road that leads to life. I encourage you to do the same. We are saved by our faith in Christ and by that alone are we saved. However, as Christians, we are called to imitate Christ with our lives and walk the path that leads to life.

Lenten Project - Dr. Mark Zimmerman
Missionary to Nepal Supported by St. Andrew

Dr. Mark Zimmerman is a United Methodist missionary assigned to work in Kathmandu, Nepal, a predominantly Hindu country in the Himalayan region of Asia. Nepal is a country of 25 million people located between China and India. Its mountains, lack of infrastructure, and land-locked status pose extreme barriers to development. Its per capita income is USD \$218 and the vast majority of people are subsistence farmers. Maternity and child mortality rates are among the highest in the world, and there is very little access to any form of health care in rural areas.

A medical doctor specializing in internal medicine, Mark has been working in Nepal since 1986 – initially as a hospital-based clinical doctor, later as medical director of Patan Hospital (1998-2005), and now as director of the Nick Simons Institute (NSI), an organization working in Nepal with a mission to train and support skilled, compassionate rural health care workers.



A nutritionist and dietitian by training, Mark's wife Deirdre works as advisor to Nutrition Promotion and Consultancy Services, an organization which gives nutrition training and monitoring for women and children living in slums. The organization also provides basic health training and access to health services.
