Worship Service to Remain at 9:45

Hopefully, most of you have heard by now that we will be staying with one worship service as we head into the fall. We wanted you to know that this was not a decision made lightly. At this point in time, we just don't have the support needed for two worship services. We don't have enough folks to run the sound board, the computer

and our musicians have no substitutes when they need a Sunday off. (Let us know if you would be willing to serve in any of the positions mentioned!) As with most decisions, we know that this a big disappointment for some folks as you enjoyed the time and the worship style of the service you attended, for others you are enjoying being together with everyone and appreciate the different styles of music, etc. Please know that we are always looking for ways to help folks draw closer to God during worship so please share with the Pastor Barb and the Worship committee your thoughts and suggestions.

As was mentioned in the August newsletter, the General Conference of the United Methodist Church voted to allow each individual congregation to decide how it will handle same sex marriages. At our congregational meeting on June 2^{nd,} we said that we would take a vote later in the summer to give folks time to process and pray. On August 11th at our congregational meeting, we voted.

Our Lay Leader, Faith Schlegel, SPRC chair, LeRoy Moser and Trustee chair, Tracy Donmoyer counted the votes. The results are as follows:

51 folks voted in favor of allowing same gender weddings to be performed on the St. Andrew campus and 25 folks voted against same gender wedding being performed on the St. Andrew campus.

There has been some division and some hurt feelings as a result of this decision. We also know that some folks are choosing to leave. Please continue to hold St. Andrew in your prayers as we move forward.


Christian Companions Women's Bible Study - Walking through life with God and each other.

The item for September is Rice







SOURCE OF LIFE: PROVIDING COMMUNITIES, SCHOOLS AND LOCAL CHURCHES WITH BOREHOLES FOR SAFE DRINKING WATER

1. Introduction

While Burundi has made great strides in providing water for its population, there are still over 40% of its rural population without access to an improved water source (UNICEF 2020). With respect to sanitation, the situation is much grimmer.

2. Project rationale (description of the need affecting the community)

As Burundians look to recover socially and economically, access to safe drinking water is a central concern. As it stands, about nearly half of the population lacks access to clean, safe drinking water and this situation remains a big challenge particularly for households in rural areas. Additionally, only approximately 20% of the population has basic sanitation services while 28% of the total population and 44% of the rural

population continue to practice open defecation, according to UNICEF. Currently, 33% of the population in urban areas has access compared to 14% of the population in rural areas. This disparity is, in part, due to the fact that funds and resources are evenly distributed to both regions despite a majority of the population residing in rural areas.

Sanitation infrastructure such as sinks, sewage systems, toilets and latrines, are generally of poor quality. This infrastructure is also poorly maintained, often resulting in a lack of basic sanitation facilities. Ultimately, only 46% of Burundians can access basic sanitation facilities with a majority of public facilities still lacking water points.

This resulting in disease burden, especially on children, is great, with 37% of child deaths attributable to diarrhea. As population

is increasing, with current growth trends averaging about 3.3% per year, the demands on existing infrastructure, especially at aging school facilities, are increasing dramatically. So, while a



community may have a water point, or sanitation facilities, they may not be adequate to serve the current population, which results in rationing supplies, long lines, long walks to seek additional sources of water, and/or a return to unimproved sources of water or open defecation in frustration. As schools grow, taking in more students to keep the pace with the growing number of pupils and growing education level of the population becomes more difficult. The schools are barely able to keep up with the need for classroom and dormitory space, and are not in a position to properly expand water and sanitation facilities. Crowded conditions and poor sanitation facilities also result in increased sick days and other health concerns among the student population. Which also decreases the number of days students spend in the classroom.

This is also a challenge for the local churches with toilets and latrines that are generally of poor quality and poorly maintained often resulting in a lack of basic sanitation facilities. The government has threatened to close all the church infrastructures without adequate sanitation facilities and the United Methodist Church is not spared.

The lack of drinking water or the difficulty to access it are the primordial causes of health problems among children under 5 years of age who are prone to water-borne diseases such as schistosomiasis and malnutrition. Many Burundians drink from unsafe sources of water. The undeveloped health care industry makes matters worse, as those with diseases are not treated

properly.

Even if people have access to water, there are still other constraints. In some areas, the soil is sandy, and latrines need lined (and therefore expensive) pits. In other areas, the soil is rocky, and digging pits is difficult and expensive. Wood for superstructures and slabs is extremely scarce, and cement slabs are expensive. Given the widespread poverty, it will be very difficult for most people to construct proper 'improved' latrines.

The proposed project will contribute to reducing potential for conflict by reducing the scarcity of available water, and by strengthening joint planning by the different stakeholders. It will be essential to use a 'do no harm' lens when developing catchment management plans and when designing specific infrastructure. The development of water harvesting infrastructure and water points for



people and livestock can have an effect on seasonal movement patterns, and can also have effects on downstream water availability. This needs to be considered carefully.

3. Addressing community needs

The United Methodist Church in Burundi, as a faith-based institution, sees the right to safe water and adequate sanitation as a fundamental issue of human worth, dignity and justice. Our projects are designed to assist communities and institutions to recover their sense of pride in their community by helping meet the basic human needs for water and sanitation.

4. Description of the project

To help Burundi achieve universal coverage for water and sanitation by:

- 1) Providing safe reliable drinking water to communities, schools and church facilities in Burundi that otherwise are forced to use a less desirable or less reliable source of water.
- 2) Providing sanitation facilities and raising community awareness and education about the harm of open defecation. Which is contributing to the health and welfare of the communities served.

5. Impact of the project



We would like to see communities take pride in their water and sanitation facilities, keeping them clean and sanitary and in good working order. We would like to see water points still in use 5 years after installation. We would like to see healthier outcomes for children under 5 in the intervention communities, particularly those that receive both water and sanitation interventions. We would like to see a reduction in school absenteeism in schools where water and sanitation facilities are improved, as an indicator of project success.

We would like to see improved welfare of rural communities in the East

of Burundi

SCARCE AND UNEQUAL ACCESS TO WATER IN RUYIGI, RUTANA AND CANKUZO PROVINCES

The lack or limited access to clean, safe drinking water is a source of various health problems among households of rural Burundi and contributes to aggravating malnutrition.

A shortage of safe drinking water presents a health crisis for children — water and sanitation-related diseases such as diarrhea are one of the biggest causes of death for children under five around Burundi.

Poor access to clean water also undermines their development: children, and particularly girls, often miss out on education as they make long journeys to fetch clean water.

Below is a table showing an overview of the situation of water and sanitation in the church districts located in Rutana, Ruyigi and Cankuzo provinces with limited access to basic sanitation.
